It is far from a Tobacco Dieta.



Engraved on Him is Sacred Flowers that were Precious Companions to The Aztec People. One of These Flowers are known to be Tobacco.



The process of domestication began perhaps 6,000-8,000 y ago in the Andes of South America.

In The Western Mind, Tobacco is Poorly Understood and Abused.

Its actually surreal to think how much we have simply ignored about this plant.

And much of The Tobacco for sale today is filled with additives and chemicals. Bizarre. How did this happen?

Genetic selection and modification by people ultimately produced species such as Nicotiana rustica and Nicotiana tabacum, which have larger leaves and higher nicotine content than earlier wild varieties.

Domesticated tobaccos spread into Mesoamerica and the Caribbean and reached parts of what is now the southeastern and southwestern United States.

However, they were absent in most of western North America, a vast area inhabited by hunter-gatherers where several different species of indigenous (often referred to as "desert" or "wild") tobaccos are found, including Nicotiana quadrivalvis, Nicotiana attenuata, and Nicotiana obtusifolia.

Thus,

There was an important change in The Over All Human Relationship with Tobacco when The Wild Plants got Cultivated for their desired Big Leaved Properties and The Trade of Tobacco started commercially thanks (or no thanks to) The French Traders in The 1800's.

There are so many Sacred Ways that Tobacco was and still is brought into relationship

with The 2 Leggeds.

If we Think about Tobacco as a Plant, and not only as an end product, we can start with a Classic Ethnobotanical Journey:

It starts with a seed

And where to plant that seed is important.

In certain communities Tobacco Seeds are plant around The Edges of Gardens and Homes as it is believed to Hold Protection.

Form the beginning Tobacco as revered and respected.

After The Plant has Grown to Maturity, there is The Harvest.

Leaves and Seed and even The Flowers are Harvested.

Seeds are saved for a Next Crop.

Leaves can be used Fresh or Cured for All Different Kinds of Medicines, from Skin Conditions, Body Cleansing/Purge, Spiritual Cleans/Purge, Bathing, Womb Medicine, Smoke Medicine, Offering Medicine.

Flowers for Offering, Flower Essence, Bath Remedy.
